### Present Danger Threats

The identification of one of these threats constitutes present danger.

#### ***Maltreatment***

<i>Current Maltreatment</i>	The parents' mistreatment of the child is occurring right now. The maltreating conditions include: physical abuse, sexual abuse, emotional abuse, and neglect.
<i>Face/Head/Torso</i>	This includes bruises, cuts, abrasions, swelling or any physical injury alleged to have occurred as a result of caregiver maltreatment.
<i>Serious Bodily Injury</i>	Typically, this would include bone breaks, deep lacerations, burns, diagnosable malnutrition, etc. Also included is multiple serious injuries to a single child, (i.e. severe burn and broken arm).
<i>Premeditated</i>	These are injuries to a child or conditions allegedly resulting from a deliberate, preconceived plan or thinking by the caregiver. Examples include (but not limited to): immersion burns, intentional starvation or dehydration, intentionally causing a medical condition or illness.
<i>Several Victims</i>	This refers to the identification of more than one child who currently is being maltreated and the children are in immediate danger.
<i>Life Threatening Living Arrangements</i>	This is based on specific information which indicates that a child's living situation is an immediate threat to the child's safety. This would include the most serious health circumstances: buildings capable of collapse, exposure to extreme weather conditions, fire hazards, electrical wiring exposed, weapons accessible and available, and open sewage, etc.
<i>Unexplained Injuries</i>	This refers to a serious injury which caregivers cannot, will not, or do not explain. A child may be injured that was supervised by the caregiver but the caregiver does not offer an explanation. Medical providers may express that the caregiver's explanation does not match the injury.

<i>Bizarre Cruelty</i>	Examples include locking or tying up children, intentional isolation, torture, exaggerated emotional abuse, forcing children to stand in place for long periods of time, forcing children to eat materials that cause extreme pain or illness, intentional withhold of food or water for long periods of time.
<i>Sexual Abuse</i>	Report of sexual abuse by a caregiver or other person who has current or immediate access to the child.
<b>Child</b>	
<i>Child Is Under 10</i>	This present danger threat only applies if the child is without any care or supervision. It does not apply if the caregiver has arranged for care of the child and hasn't returned at the agreed upon time. Examples include children who are found wandering or unaccompanied without a caregiver in the area and/or children who have been picked up by law enforcement because they have no caregiver available.
<i>Child Needs Medical Attention</i>	Medical care is immediately necessary and if not provided may seriously affect the child's health and well-being. This includes extreme medical/dental conditions and threats to mental health including suicidal or homicidal ideation or gestures with immediate ability to follow through.
<i>Parent's Viewpoint Of Child Is Bizarre</i>	This is the extreme viewpoint and not a negative attitude toward the child. Examples include believing the child is possessed by the devil, has special powers, presents an extreme threat to the caregiver beyond developmental caregiver conflict, and/or child is seductive or complicit in sexual abuse.
<i>Fearful Child</i>	This refers to extreme fear. Children who are described as being obviously afraid of: their present circumstance, the home situation, or a person because of a concern of personal severe harm. This fear is not always expressed verbally. Children may beg to be removed from a home, not left alone with a caregiver, and may demonstrate symptoms of fear (screaming, trembling, and becoming immobile).
<b>Parent</b>	
<i>Parents Are Unable to Perform Parental Duties</i>	This refers to parental duties and responsibilities consistent with providing basic to care or assuring safety. The inability to provide basic care leaves the child in a threatened state.
<i>Parents Described As Dangerous</i>	Caregivers are described as physically/verbally intimidating and threatening, brandishing weapons, known to be dangerous and aggressive, currently behaving in attacking or aggressive ways, etc. As Dangerous
<i>Parent Out-of-Control</i>	These caregivers cannot focus themselves or manage their behavior in ways to properly perform their parental responsibilities. Their actions or lack of actions may not be directed at the children, but may impact them in dangerous ways. This may be observed as specific behavior and/or choices, emotions, impairment or apparent mental health conditions.
<i>Parent Intoxicated or Out of Control</i>	The caregiver is reported to be drunk or under the influence of drugs now. The type of substance doesn't matter. The state of the parent's condition is more important. The parent(s)/caregiver(s) incapacity has a direct effect on their judgment and behavior, affecting the child's safety. Examples include a caregiver who is detained by law enforcement because they are driving while intoxicated or a caregiver who is passed out or incapacitated due to drugs or alcohol. This may include certain prescription drugs that are being used beyond the prescribed amount or combined with other intoxicants. There is a direct and observable pattern or description that indicates a parent/caregiver is unable to have control over parenting practices that keep the child safe.
<i>Intimate Partner Violence Present</i>	This considers family situations in which both child maltreatment and spousal abuse is reported to be occurring in the present time.
<i>Family Will Flee</i>	The caregiver(s) have rejected child protection intervention, are not allowing access to their child for an evaluation of the child's safety, and have indicated that they will flee.
