## Selection, Engagement and Seduction of Children and Adult by Child Molesters, (Jewell Jensen, Jensen & Bailey, 2002)

- Why does grooming work?
  - Most adult don't know what to look for.
  - Most adults don't want to see it or believe it.
- How does grooming work?
  - By targeting specific children, families and communities to exploit.
  - Seducing the child/ren and adults.
  - Preparing for disclosure/confrontation
  - Learning from experience.

### Disclosure/Reporting Rates of CSA

- ◆ **Between 5% and 16% of children who are being sexually abused disclose.**
  - ◆ **Between 10% and 12% of disclosures were reported to authorities.**

### Empirical Studies into the True Rates of False Allegations in CSA

- ◆ Trocme, N. & Bala, N. (authors of three large scale national Canadian studies that took place between 1994 and 2005)
- ◆ Rate of false allegations in cases of CSA was 2%-6%.
  - False allegation rates in physical abuse/neglect =4%
- ◆ Rate of false allegations that arose during custody disputes was 12%
  - False allegations were more frequently made by a non-custodial parent, usually a father (15%) than custodial parent or mother (2%).

### Polygraph Testing Leads to Better Understanding of Adult and Juvenile Sex Offenders (Hindman, J. & Peters, J., 2001)

| Adult Offenders           | Pre-polygraph | Post-polygraph |
|---------------------------|---------------|----------------|
| Ave. # of Victims         | 2.9           | 11.6           |
| Sexually Abused As Child  | 61%           | 30%            |
| Sexually Abusing As Child | 27%           | 76%            |

### Adverse childhood experiences, paraphilias, and serious criminal violence among federal sex offenders (Drury et. al, 2016)

- 225 Federal sex offenders
  - 36% reported abandonment by father/neglect
  - 28% physical abuse
  - 27% sexual abuse
  - 24% verbal/emotional abuse
- Reported an average of 5 paraphilias

### Prevalence Rates of Male and Female Sexual Violence Perpetrators in a National Sample of Adolescents (Ybarra and Mitchell, 2013)

- ◆ National sample of 1058 adolescents.
- ◆ Nearly 1 in 10 (9%) of youth (<18) reported that they had engaged in an attempted or completed rape of another minor.

**Sexual Assault of Young Children as Reported to Law Enforcement: Victim, Incident and Offender Characteristics (Snyder, 2000)**

- ◆ 40% of the offenders of children under 6 were other children.
  - 13% of offenders were age 7 to 11
  - 27% were age 12 to 17.
- ◆ 39% of offenders of children age 6 to 11 were juveniles.
- ◆ 27% of juvenile victims (11 yrs+) were abused by juvenile offenders.

**The Value of Polygraph Testing in Sex Offender Management (English, Jones, Pasini-Hall, Patrick and Cooley-Towell, 2003)**

**What to Do**

- ◆ Do not show negative feelings or immediately punish.
- ◆ Gather and document details about what kind of behaviors are being described.
- ◆ Who was involved, how it was initiated.
- ◆ "What are you guys doing, where did you learn that?"

**Department of Education Study United Kingdom, 2016**

- ◆ Interviewed 2,504 adults
- ◆ One third said they have suspected child abuse and failed to report it.
- ◆ 36%-37% of those who failed said reporting would be "more challenging than delivering news about the death of a friend or family member or reporting a crime committed by a family member.
- ◆ Fear about possibly "misreading" the situation or "wrongly accusing the person were deterrents to reporting.

**Sexual Crimes Among Males**

- ◆ 5% to 33% of males have committed at least one sexual offense (GrotPELLIER & Elliot, 2002; Koss, 1987; Lisak & Miller, 2002, Abbey, et al. 2001).
- ◆ 1% to 2% of the adult male population will be convicted of a sexual crime (California Office of the Attorney General, 2004; P Marshall, 1997).
- ◆ As of May 2017, one out of every 74 males in Oregon was a registered sex offender (NCMEC, 2017). National average is 1 in 189.
- ◆ Washington = 1 in 169 (+/- 2%)

**How Many Are Really Out There?**

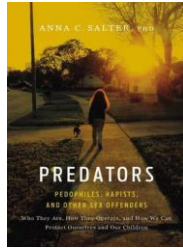
- ◆ 5% of the male population (1 in 20 men) suffer from pedophilia (Seto, 2008).
- ◆ 4% to 7% "Dunkelfeld" (male and females combined) offenders in population (Abel, 2012).

### Predators: Pedophiles, Rapists and Other Sex Offenders (Salter, 2018)

Fewer than 5% of sex offenders are ever apprehended.

\* This does not account for the number of undetected offenses each of these individual offenders engaged in prior to arrest.

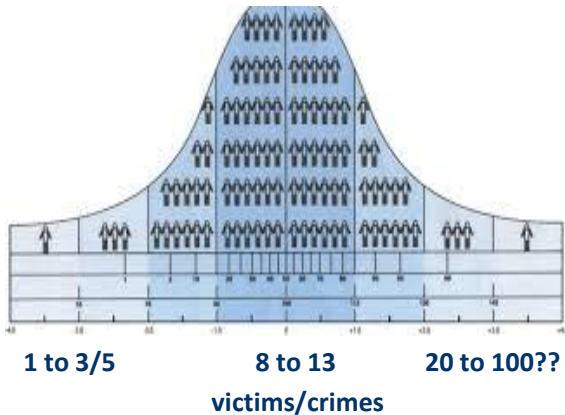

### The dark figure of sexual offending: new evidence from federal sex offenders (DeLisi, et al. 2016)

- ♦ After beginning specialized treatment in various programs, sex offenders initially under-reported the number of sex crimes by 5-8X to 75X
- ♦ Typical number of child victims was 8 to 13
- ♦ Average number of events per victim was 10
- ♦ 80 to 130 crimes

### “Crossover” or “Crime Switching”

- ♦ Exhibitionists and voyeurs targeting children
- ♦ Exhibitionist and voyeurs advancing to rape
- ♦ Crossover
  - Age (40% to 60%)
  - Gender (23% to 63%)
  - Relationship (50% to 74%)
  - SA/rape and CSA (30% to 76%)
  - Child porn and CSA (85%)
  - Bestiality (30%)
  - SO and Psychopathy (20%)

### Motivational VS Operational Goals and Behaviors

- ♦ Pre-Offending Behavior
  - Public/family image
  - Engagement with child and family
  - Control and ongoing access
- ♦ Offending Behavior
  - Gradual desensitization and sexualization
- ♦ Post Offending Behavior
  - Denial, alignment, escape
- ♦ Place self in situation or relationship to have sexual contact with child/ren.
- ♦ Avoid disclosure, detection and reporting.
- ♦ Enhance sexual/intimate experience with victim.
- ♦ Enhance the “thrill of getting away with it.”
- ♦ Be able to pursue new victims

## The History of Child Sex Abuse Prevention in the US

- ◆ Programs emerged in the late 70's and are currently in place in 85% of the schools in America.
- ◆ Since their inception, they have raised public awareness about child sexual abuse.
- ◆ They teach children about abuse and provide an arena for disclosure.
- ◆ School based programs are relatively cheap, provide easy access and, a captive audience.

## The National Debate About Prevention Efforts

- ◆ Model transferred from rape prevention programs.
- ◆ Most programs were developmentally inappropriate.
- ◆ Involved insufficient role rehearsal.
- ◆ Did not account for the most common relationship between the offender and child or, the process involved in offending.
- ◆ Experts feared that parents were "abdicated" their responsibility because their children "had" "that safety talk at school."

## Possible Explanations for Poor Outcomes

- ◆ Inadvertently Promoted Counterproductive Message
  - First, the in-school prevention programs made some parents feel "it's been covered."
  - The model implied that it's the **child's responsibility** to protect themselves.
  - Models were wrong.

## "Stranger Danger" & "Good Touch, Bad Touch"

- ◆ Incorrectly assumes that most children are abused by strangers.
- ◆ May create unnecessary fears.
- ◆ Fails to understand offender MO and the impact on children.
- ◆ May confuse children and/or cause them to feel more guilty.
- ◆ Fails to make use of a better concept – "Secret Touching"

## What Offenders Tell Us About Prevention (Kaufman, et al, 1999)

- ◆ 71% (292) of the offenders reported that their victim/s tried at least one strategy.
- ◆ Of these:
  - 17% used 1 strategy.
  - 45% used 2 to 6.
  - 10% used 7 to 11.
  - 28% used all 12.
- ◆ 29% (120) of the offenders reported that their victim/s did not try any strategy.

## Kaufman's Conclusion

- ◆ "Most children do not know, remember or feel empowered to try prevention strategies."
- ◆ Child focused sex abuse prevention should be our "last focus of prevention."
- ◆ We need to "make prevention a national priority where the burden of safety is shifted from children to adults."

## What Did Oregon Decided To Do in 2002

- ♦ Reduce the number of children who are abused and do not report via community education.
- ♦ Improve our response to victims/disclosures.
- ♦ Increase parental understanding and intervention around etiology, prevention and early intervention of PSB.
- ♦ Reduce the number of adolescent and adult offenders who are not being identified and/or managed.
- ♦ Increase reporting and conviction rates (jury education).
- ♦ Do a better job of managing our known offenders.

## What We Teach The Community About CSA/SA & Sex Offenders

- ♦ At least 1 in 5 girls and 1 in 10 boys are sexually abused.
- ♦ Most kids can't stop this, protect themselves or tell.
- ♦ During half of the incidents, someone is close by and doesn't see it and 30% of adult fail to report when they do know.
- ♦ Only 5% to 16% of child victims report and false allegations are rare.
- ♦ The old prevention strategies didn't work well.
- ♦ How to protect/talk to your children and our community
- ♦ 1 in 10 to 20 men have sexually abused children.
- ♦ Only 25% to 30% of offenders were SA during childhood.
- ♦ 75% of offenders started offending as youth.
- ♦ 60%-70% Cross over rate.
- ♦ They engage in grooming and half are able talk folks out of believing children, protecting them or reporting.
- ♦ Most will periodically or frequently offend throughout their lives and never get caught

## What We Teach The Community About Grooming

- ♦ How offenders pick, churches/schools/YSOs, families and children.
- ♦ How they seduce children into:
  - Not recognizing that what's happening is abuse.
  - Thinking that they are "going along with it."
  - Not feeling like they can tell someone.
  - Protecting offender from discovery.
- ♦ How they seduce adults:
  - Into not seeing it.
  - Not believing children.
  - Not reporting them.
  - Defending them.

## “The Tipping Point,” Social Change and Media Coverage

- ◆ 20 to 80 people attend each workshop but 1000’s read the local paper.
- ◆ Good press coverage offer sponsors (funders/agencies) positive PR.
- ◆ We all need to help the media provide accurate, helpful information to the public “For Kid’s Sake”.
- ◆ Offer to “go over” the article before it’s printed to make sure they “got the facts” right.
- ◆ Have reporters talk to trainers and parents.

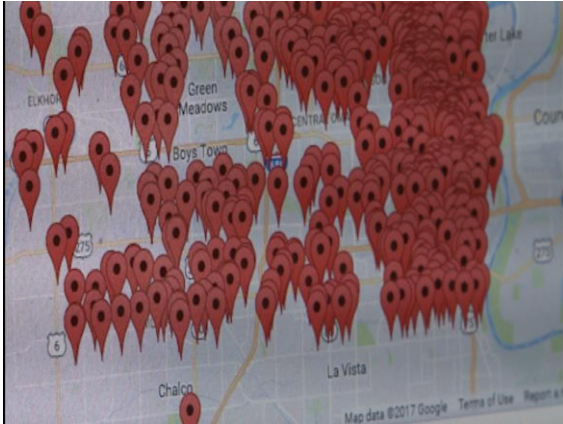

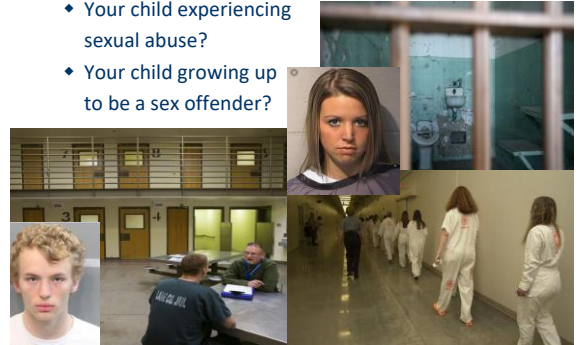

**Talking to Children About Sexual Abuse**

- ◆ "Your private parts are private and special. It's not ok for anyone to look at or touch your private parts and it's not ok for you to look at or touch other people's private parts. It's also not ok for you to look at pictures of people without clothes on."
- ◆ "If anyone does this, you need to tell us right away" and it "could be anyone, uncle Jimmy/aunt Sally, the pastor....."
- ◆ "Touching problems" and "secret touching," not a "sickness" and it's more like "stealing and lying."
- ◆ They use "tricks" to get kids to do it and to keep kids from telling. How might someone "try to keep you from telling?"
- ◆ "I won't be mad at you" and "You won't be in trouble."
- ◆ Make list of other people they can tell.
- ◆ Blend the sex abuse check-ups in with other safety talks.
- ◆ Repeat three to four times per year.

Dear Leaders of the Faith Community:

On Tuesday October 14, 2014 the WYCA Clark County Sexual Assault Program is offering an all-day training entitled "Sex Offenders in the Faith Community: Child Safety, Church Policy & Risk Management" presented by Cory Jewell Jensen, MS. The training will be held at the Water Resource Center in Vancouver.

The purpose of this training is to present information about child sexual assault, factors that make churches particularly vulnerable, developing vulnerable child safety protocols, understanding and handling mandated reports as well as responding to disclosures, community resources for survivors and suggestions for safety planning with known offenders.

Research indicates that 1 in 3 girls and 1 in 5 boys will be sexually assaulted by the time they reach 18 years of age. In the year 2000, U.S. Bureau of Justice Statistics reported that 5% of juvenile victims knew their offenders, and the FBI estimates that there is a sex offender living in every house in the United States. Offenders commonly seek out opportunities to be near children, which puts churches and other community organizations that serve families, and utilize volunteers, at particular risk.
